Note: Entries in your bibliography should be double-spaced

<b>Journal article:</b>	Last name, first initial[s]. (Publication year). Title of article. <i>Name of journal</i> , vol. #(issue # if each issue starts with page 1), pg. #-pg.#.	Reynolds, L. (1994). Advocates plan to push for more childcare support. <i>HR Focus</i> , 71(3), 1-3.
<b>Newspaper article:</b>	Last name, first initial[s]. (Year, month day of publication). Title of article. <i>Name of newspaper</i> , section and page #.	Niebuhr, G. (1998, October 14). Church urged to do more for women in leadership. <i>New York Times</i> , p. A12.
<b>InfoTrac databases:</b> (Expanded Academic, Business and Company ASAP Health & Wellness Res. Ctr., General Reference Ctr.)	Last name, first initial[s]. (Publication year).
